GEARING UP FOR 2017 Chris Ricardi, President

It is a great feeling each spring to watch the ice break on Sabbathday Lake and to see the blue water materialize in front of the house. It took some patience this year. In early April there was still solid ice from shore to shore. But the sun kept doing what a spring sun does and on April 17 waves were lapping the shoreline. After a long and cold March, I welcomed the warming days of April and I began thinking about getting the kayaks out and uncovering the boat. I also began to think about the different things that the Sabbathday Lake Association (SDLA) would be doing to protect the water quality of our lake.

One of the most important things we can all do is to prevent erosion runoff from getting into the lake. At the risk of sounding like a broken record, we continue to talk about this and hope everyone living in the watershed thinks about ways to help. Eroded soils and sediment carry nutrients into the lake, which feed algae growth and starts a chain reaction that can cloud the water during the warm summer months. When the SDLA completed watershed surveys in cooperation with Maine Department of Environmental Protection (MEDEP) and the Cumberland County Soil and Water District in 1996 and 2009 the most significant findings involved roadways and driveways where rain runoff cuts channels and washes soil into the Lake. One big threat that was identified in both 1996 and 2009 was sand left

over from winter sanding operations. After the 1996 survey, engineering designs were applied to roads to try to divert road runoff into settling areas and away from direct paths to the Lake. Unfortunately, there are still some roadways around the Lake where road sand can be washed directly into the Lake. This past winter was a snowy one, and the town spread a lot of sand and salt on the roads within the Sabbathday Lake watershed. Some of these streets are back roads with low speed limits and the sanding seemed excessive. When the spring thaw finally got here, I was amazed at the amount of dirt and sand that was on the road in front of my house. I could see evidence of flow patterns of rivulets that clearly showed sand runoff that happened during the first rain storms. I got into my car and drove around the Lake to investigate the situation on the roadways and to look for specific areas where the road sand had washed into the lake. I found several. This year the SDLA board began to explore the possibility of working with the Town of New Gloucester to review the use of road sand in areas that directly impact the Lake, and we plan to discuss the possibility of identifying sections of roads that could be considered low sand/salt or no sand/salt. This practice is used in other lake watersheds in New England to protect water quality. We hope to formulate a plan that



will reduce this risk to the Lake. Over the past several years we have worked together with the Town of New Gloucester and have found the administrators and selectmen to be very interested in ideas we have and what we are doing as an association, and they have proven to be good partners when there are things we can work on together to protect the Lake

In regards to the Town, I want to offer thanks to Paul First who has been the Town Manager for the past few years. He has always been eager to listen and act as a liaison for the Association, and he invited us to present lake related issues to the selectmen and town committees. Part of our charter as an organization is to provide education on lake conservation practices to our members and the greater community. Paul has been very helpful. Paul stepped down this year and we wish him the best of luck in the future.

The annual water quality testing is done in conjunction with the Town. Each year the Association receives help with funding needed (continued on page 4)

AN INCENTIVE TO BE LAKESMART

The Lake Association has approved an incentive program for property owners seeking to become LakeSmart. If you need to improve your Buffer Zone along the shoreline, that is, add new plantings to prevent erosion and soil run-off, SDLA will reimburse you 50% of your cost up to \$250 for your efforts. However, you must apply for a LakeSmart Review first and we will help you see what needs to be accomplished. If you do not achieve your LakeSmart Award but are making progress with a goal of receiving the award, we have a sign for that, too!

It is with great pleasure that I announce that we completed our fifth annual invasive plant survey of the lake last fall. As you know we have the lake broken down to 25 individual sections, 12 on the East Shore, 12 on the West Shore and several low spots in the lake. Many of our volunteers are able to survey 2 sections each year. We have had good participation, which allowed us to complete another Level 3 survey (entire littoral zone*) of the lake.

Sabbathday Lake Association IPP (SLIPPers) by the numbers for 2016 (recap):

19 Volunteers participated in the 2016 Survey
Level 3 Survey Completed (entire littoral zone)
222 Total Hours donated to the 2016 effort
83 of those hours were on the water and
139 Hours donated to: Training, Preparation, Outreach, Travel,
Plant Identification, Co-ordination, etc.
3 New Plants were identified in 2016 survey
Total number of plants identified by the IPP team stands at 44

*The Good News....Based on that survey, the results indicate that no invasive plants were found. These numbers are the result of an informed, dedicated and selfless group of concerned volunteer citizen scientists, willing to work for the benefit of many, by helping protect this lake for future generations to enjoy. THANK YOU!

In 2016 we organized and co-sponsored an IPP 101 Training class put on by the Maine Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program which was held at the New Gloucester Congregational – Christian Church on August the 6th, 2016 with over 60 participants from around the state in attendance. But more importantly we had 4 SDLA members attending who qualified for their certification. They are **George and Logan True**, **Craig Doremus** and **Chris Ricardi**. Also attending for a refresher were *Stu Belden* and *Don and Diantha Grant*. The event was cosponsored by the Crystal Lake Association, Highland Lake Association, Thompson Lake Environmental Association and the Little Sebago Lake Association.

I want to thank and recognize SDLA volunteers *Don and Diantha Grant* and *Chris Ricardi* for their help in the setup and breakdown of the event and *Cheryl Welch* from the Crystal Lake Association and *Pam Wilkinson* from the Little Sebago Lake Association. These volunteers helped make this event a terrific success! The SLIPPers do not have any major events scheduled for this year. We plan on having our annual Summer Kick Off meeting to get updated on the latest data and information surrounding the threat of Invasive Plants in Maine. And we will be holding our annual survey July through September.

Our Kick-Off meeting will be held at the Shaker Community Library on Saturday, July 15th at 9AM. To learn how you can participate please let me know by calling 786-3392. Coffee and pastries will be provided. Come and join in the fun!

The threat of invasive plants entering this lake is very real and would be physically and financially devastating if they are found in Sabbathday Lake. I would like to encourage everyone who is interested in this activity to give me a call and we can discuss how you can get involved with the Sabbathday Lake IPP. We will always need interested, concerned and involved association members to pitch in and do their share. The continued good health of Sabbathday Lake is depending on you.

to hire the consultant, FB Environmental Associates in Portland, who completes the water testing and writes the annual report. In turn, the Town receives a copy of the annual water quality report, which is then included in the annual report. I provided FB Environmental some feedback in 2015 regarding the report content, and in the 2016 report they did a great job revamping the report format and providing clear discussions of testing data and what it means regarding the lake water quality. A copy of the 2016 report can be viewed from the SDLA website. I highly recommend anyone who is interested in learning about the current state of Sabbathday Lake water quality to check out the 2016 report.

Another thing happened this year that is a great source of positive karma for our community on the Lake. The New Gloucester Eagles Club (Fraternal Order of Eagles) located at the south end of the Lake offered to host a fundraiser breakfast for the SDLA on Sunday, July 2. In fact, we met with them recently and learned that the 600 members of the Eagles Club in New Gloucester raise a lot of money each year to support local and national charities. This year they decided to support the SDLA. It is a wonderful feeling to have them recognize the work we are doing and offer to help like this. We would like to thank David Marston and all of the Eagles members who have offered to host this fundraiser. They also have offered their meeting room for our July 12 annual business meeting and pot luck. See the notice on page 3 regarding the upcoming fundraiser and the meeting. I encourage everyone who can make the breakfast to join in

and invite your families and friends to come!

We will be continuing our efforts to keep milfoil and other invasive plants out of the Lake again this year with our Invasive Plant Patrol survey and our boat inspection program. Each year the Maine Department of Environmental Protection publishes an updated boater handout that has a map of infested lakes in Maine. Each year there are more yellow dots identifying surrounding lakes that have milfoil. The first line of defense is Courtesy Boat Inspectors (CBIs) at the boat ramp on Outlet Road. We will be using student CBIs and teaming with Bresca and the Honeybee at Outlet Beach like we have done in the past. This provides boat inspection coverage for most weekend mornings and other times when the Outlet Beach is open. Like last year, we are seeking additional CBI volunteers to cover weekend evenings from 6-7:30 after the Outlet Beach closes for the day. It is a very easy and relaxing situation. Bring a chair and a book, and enjoy an evening on the lake shore. We will provide information and training for anyone who would like to volunteer. There is a schedule posted on the website that shows open timeslots. If you are interested call me (926-3721) or send an email to me at iricardi@maine.rr.com.

We will continue our LakeSmart program in an effort to help property owners identify ways they can help reduce impacts on the Lake. Through LakeSmart we offer site reviews by experts from the Maine Lakes Society. For the past two years the SDLA has offered matching funds for plants used for erosion control. This year matching funds will also be offered for other types of materials that are

needed to address landscaping improvements identified during a Lakesmart review. We hope LakeSmart will be a valuable way property owners can learn about things they can do to further manage their properties and help the Lake. I think it is important to note that many people are doing an excellent job with their properties. That is the primary reason we have clear water in the summer months. But the loading of nutrients from runoff is a cumulative effect where many small problems such as roadway, driveway, and other types of property erosion add up to a larger impact on the Lake. Whether participating in LakeSmart or not, we hope that everyone remains vigilant in these efforts

Enjoy the summer days and the clear water.



One of the most important things that the Sabbathday Lake Association does is monitoring boats that enter the lake at the boat ramp at Outlet Beach for invasive plants. Much of the boat monitoring is done by student courtesy boat inspectors (CBI) and by the Outlet Beach operator and her staff. They monitor the ramp on most weekend mornings from 6 am until 9 am and during the Outlet Beach business hours from 9 am to 6 pm. Last year, we determined that boaters often launch on weekend evenings. This year, SDLA is seeking volunteers to monitor the boat ramp on weekend evenings from 6-7:30. Are you interested in spending an evening or two at the ramp and helping? Most evenings there are only a few boats. Bring a book and enjoy an evening at The Outlet. Volunteers will receive instructions on how to check boats and complete inspection forms.
